Looking Back on 2022

What a year the SBC had! From the 50th anniversary of the Capital City Century to the first Trivia Night, there was no shortage of rides and events for members to choose from. Highlights include:

JANUARY

The Recruitment Committee was formed to assist in finding club members interested in serving as board members. Thanks to Jordan Litvak, Kathryn Hanlon and Michael Phelon for serving on this important project, and special thanks to Kathryn for continuing to provide leadership.

FEBRUARY

The SBC's **first annual Trivia Night** was held at Harvest Market.
Plans are already in the works for the 2023 edition.

The "Slow C" group continued to be a popular option for Tuesday nights. This social and inclusive group is a great option for beginner and experienced riders alike.

After years of storing club-owned equipment at a location on private property, the Board voted to rent a **storage unit** and move all items into the space.

MARCH

sbc travels. The SBC had great representation at the Dirty South Roubaix Gravel Race held in Alto Pass, Illinois. There was a dinner meetup at Giant City State Park Lodge, where a number of SBC members were staying. Some spouses who did not participate in the race had a fun day of touring wineries and shopping. It's possible that these ladies had a better time than the racers did. Registration for this event will be opening soon, and it typically fills up quickly.

APRIL

The popular group, the **Slow Cs**, kicked off the riding season with their weekly Tuesday night rides that start from various spots in Springfield, often culminating in a stop for treats after the ride. Chief Organizer Bob Coady plans out each month's rides in advance on a spreadsheet, taking ride organization to a whole new level.

Registration opened for the popular **Sangamon Cycling Series**.

2022 was the second year for this new club initiative -- a series of four rides starting at various parks in Sangamon County. Enrollment is not limited to SBC members, although many who signed up eventually became club members.

President Troy served up some tasty burgers at the first annual **Spring Metric and Cookout** held in Centennial Park. Riders braved the cold and wind and participated in an Easter egg hunt to win prizes.

MAY

SBC TRAVELS. A group of SBC members journeyed to Defiance, Missouri, to participate in Big Sharks' **Vino Fondo**. The event was staged at Sugar Creek Winery and included road and gravel options, all with some impressive climbing. The 2023 Vino Fondo will be May 20, 2023.

A representative from the Education Center for the Visually Impaired made a presentation to the board about a proposed program to help visually impaired individuals enjoy bicycle riding as part of a tandem team. The Board will hold discussions on how the club can assist in this endeavor.

Rural Cyclery in Winchester, IL rolled out the red carpet and played host to a gravel ride for the SBC that ventured north along the Illinois River bluffs and skirted around the town of Naples. After the ride, the shop coordinated lunch from several Winchester eateries. Rural Cyclery is a corporate sponsor in the SBC.

Scott Sievers coordinated the **Ride** of Silence, an annual multi-location, international bicycle ride to commemorate cyclists killed and support those injured while riding on public roads. It helps to raise awareness among motorists, the public and decision makers of the dangers cyclists face on the roads, especially from other traffic.

Event #1 of the **Sangamon Cycling Series** kicked off from Chatham Community Park. The large turnout rode south through Auburn where a rest stop was set up in the park.

The club moved into the modern age and instituted **text messaging** to alert members of weather cancellations and last-minute changes to rides.

JUNE

SBC TRAVELS. Several SBC members traveled to the Quad Cities area to ride in the two-day **Tour of the Mississippi River Valley** presented by the Quad Cities Bicycle Club. The 2022 ride was the 45th year for this event and unfortunately, the final year.

Event #2 of the **Sangamon Cycling Series** took place, starting at Rochester Park with a rest stop in Mechanicsburg.

The club purchased a large custom pop-up tent for use as a gathering spot at events. The tent also serves

as a great backdrop for photo ops.

JULY

Event #3 of the Sangamon Cycling Series was staged at Lake Sangchris and was the setting for the first public appearance of the club's new tent. After reports of several riders getting lost on the prior event, the organizers made the decision to mark the routes. Walking tacos were served after the ride using the club's grill as an impromptu warming station.

AUGUST

The fourth and final event of the **Sangamon Cycling Series** took place at Stuart Park.

A social at Harvest Market was held to wrap up the **2022 Sangamon Cycling Series.** Anyone who registered for the series was eligible to have their name drawn for one of 16 gift certificates to local bike shops, as well as various door prizes.

Memorial rides were held to commemorate two SBC members who are no longer with us. The **Ride to Remember Mark Wagner** took place in Washington Park. The **Don Daniels Memorial Ride** took place the following day, starting at IDOT and headed east, following one of Don's favorite routes that

took riders to the Bolivia Bridge.

SEPTEMBER

September 10 was the date for the 50th Capital City Century --- the club's flagship event. The ride was based at Centennial Park. For 2022, riders headed southwest to Franklin. A rest stop was set up at Nipper Wildlife Sanctuary in Loami, and a second stop in Franklin for those riding the longer distances.

OCTOBER

The SBC provided support at the **Illinois Senior Olympics**, staged at Jim Edgar Panther Creek Fish & Wildlife in Chandlerville, IL.

Several Board members met with members of the Springfield Triathlon Club to discuss the future of the **Kids' Triathlon**. The triathlon club is in need of support and the two clubs will collaborate on the event to keep it running.

SBC TRAVELS. A group of hill-loving SBC riders traveled to Ellitsville, Indiana to ride in the Hilly Hundred. Mark your calendar for the 2023 event to be held October 6-8.

NOVEMBER

Ride Classifications

▲ 18.1-20.0+ MPH AVERAGE SPEED.

These rides are for extremely strong and competitive cyclists with expert bike handling skills. Expect cyclists to be self-sufficient, and able to maintain speeds of 19+ mph for extended distances using pace-lines and other faster riding skills.

rides are for strong, experienced cyclists with considerable group riding experience. Expect the emphasis to be on improving individual stamina and riding skills. Cyclists will not feel obligated to wait for slower riders. Many times, pace-lines are common in group riding. Cyclists should be able to handle their own flats and other minor mechanical repairs and should be comfortable navigating by map or GPS computer if separated from the group.

C 14.1-16.0 MPH AVERAGE SPEED. These rides are for competent cyclists with basic safety and bike handling skills. These rides combine social riding with improving fitness and riding ability. Expect that most cyclists will ride in groups. There may be rest stops on the route, but they

will be limited. Cyclists should be comfortable navigating by map if separated from the group and should be able to handle their own flats and other minor mechanical problems

SLOW C 12.1-14.0 MPH AVG

SPEED. These rides are for competent cyclists with basic safety and bike handling skills. These rides combine social riding with improving fitness and riding ability. Expect that most cyclists will ride in groups. There may be rest stops on the route, but they will be limited. Cyclists should be comfortable navigating by map if separated from the group and should be able to handle their own flats and other minor mechanical problems

D 10.0-12.0 MPH AVERAGE SPEED. These rides are for novice or recreational cyclists. These rides will have rest stops as needed. Expect the ride leader or another club member to sweep (stay with) the slowest cyclist. Assistance from the ride leader will be provided for flats and other minor mechanical problems.

EZ Under 10 MPH Average speed.

These rides are purely social. Expect shorter routes either in town or on

a trail and expect to ride together as a single group. No one will be dropped out of the back of the group. Assistance from the ride leader will be provided for flats and other minor mechanical problems.

GR GRAVEL. Route will be gravel, dirt or rough roads that are unsuitable for traditional road bikes.

MTB MOUNTAIN BIKE. Route will

be on mountain bike trail system, typically singletrack.

NC NON-CYCLING EVENTS. No bikes required for these events.
